OUR STORY YOUR FESTIVAL

Daisy Sanders was fresh out of school when she had an encounter at the 2009 Perth Festival that changed her life.

She went to see Irish dance-maker Michael Keegan-Dolan's earthy, confronting contemporary dance-theatre take on the classical ballet *Giselle* and it turned her world upside down.

Daisy had just started classical dance training at the Western Australian Academy of Performing Arts, but the visceral thrill of that *Giselle* led Daisy to switch from ballet to contemporary dance. Four years later she graduated from WAAPA and began her career as an independent dance artist.

That door first opened at the Festival by Keegan-Dolan and his company has stayed wide open for a decade. In 2020 Keegan-Dolan is back in Perth – and Daisy is with him, returning home from Dublin, where she has been artist-in-residence at Teac Damsa assisting the creation of $M \not A M$.

In 2018 Daisy took part in the Perth Festival Lab immersive development program. She credits this as a big factor in securing her opportunity with Teac Damsa.

The impact of a major international artist and his acclaimed company on an emerging artist like Daisy gets to the core of the purpose of Perth Festival, she says.

'The Lab increased my confidence to interact with artists from all disciplines and from all corners of the world. It made me realise that I am an artist with my whole life inside me – and they are too.'

Soon after the 2018 Festival Lab Daisy connected with Keegan-Dolan and commenced a career-changing professional engagement with Teaċ Daṁsa, supported by The Australia Council for the Arts.

'Amazing doesn't even begin to describe it', she says of completing the full circle at Perth Festival. She is excited about the prospect of seeing MÁM at Heath Ledger Theatre, where she worked as an usher for nine years.

Daisy is particularly interested in the role that the arts play in challenging and enriching individuals and our communities.

She says Perth Festival is far more than a series of events for people to attend – it balances unmatched opportunities for diverse local and international artistic voices to share their different perspectives.
