As we seek to reconnect with the world, Perth Festival 2023 celebrates 70 years by looking upwards and outwards and singing to the stars.

Distilling meaning and direction for our terrestrial lives from the stars above is central to cultures around the globe. For Noongar custodians here, a multitude of stories connect Djinda (Stars) to Country. Central to many of them is Djoondal – the old spirit woman travelling across Noongar Boodjar collecting children (stars) in her white hair, before launching into the sky to create the Milky Way.

Throughout the program there are direct, poetic, visual and allegorical references to the cosmos and our relationship to it.

We begin with a free Noongar-led opening weekend event on Lake Joondalup that uses light, lasers, sound and drones to tell that Djoondal story and places the natural lake environment at the centre of the spectacle. And we end our Festival with the immense star power of Björk, whose extraordinary theatrical extravaganza *Cornucopia* will be an Australian exclusive here in Perth.

International artists extend beyond this star power across theatre, dance and music, including Cameroon musician and dancer Blick Bassy with *Bikutsi 3000*, the legendary Kronos Quartet and French pianist Cédric Tiberghien. The cosmos is reflected across the program. In fine music with the opening orchestral concert *Music of the Spheres*, in theatre with *Hide the Dog* and WA Youth Theatre Company's *Seven Sisters*, in the strong visual arts program (especially the new work *Between Us* by Michaela Gleave that shines out into the universe from the AGWA rooftop), throughout our Literature & Ideas program and in performances under the stars from Bon Iver, West Australian Ballet and West Australian Opera.

An extraordinarily strong national performance program is led by the euphoric energy of Stephanie Lake's *Manifesto* and the thrilling theatre/film presentation *Strange Case of Dr Jekyll & Mr Hyde* from Sydney Theatre Company. Australian Dance Theatre's new commission *Tracker* and Big hART's *Punkaliyarra* continue our strong commitment to Aboriginal-led work, and much-loved WAAPA graduate Virginia Gay will appear for Black Swan in her gender bent version of *Cyrano*.

Our local independent artists continue to create world-class work, from the endless invention of choreographer Laura Boynes' *Equations of a Falling Body* to internationally-lauded local company Sensorium premiering *Wonderbox* for young audiences with disability (and their friends). These two works are among 12 Festival commissions continuing our strong investment across the local, national and international performance program.

Our Connect program goes from strength to strength, as does our regional touring program. We have contemporary music in the much-loved Rechabite, and again feature the best of international film in a full 20-week Lotterywest film season at UWA Somerville beginning with the home-grown wonder of Robert Connelly's adaption of Tim Winton's *Blueback*.

This is a Festival with sparkling events for all – a celebration of our City of Lights in full illumination. It speaks to the stars above and the shining lights within and we can't wait for you to join us.

Curated by the Berndt Museum, *BLACK SKY* features an immersive new film by a group of Yinhawangka Traditional Owners and Yanyuwa/Jingili filmmaker Michael Bonner, an energetic multimedia installation by the Tennant Creek Brio and key collection works from the Berndt Museum and the Cruthers Collection of Women's Art. Together these works span interweaving sky stories, dreams of the night and sovereign solidarities across overlapping horizons.

YOUR SUPPORT BRINGS OUR Festival to life

From the very first Perth Festival, the generosity of our community has made the magic happen.

Of all the thousands of participating artists, millions of attendees and countless extraordinary moments over the years, none of it would have been possible without a dedicated legacy of giving and investing in community wellbeing. Perth Festival is a community 'celebration machine' comprising many moving parts, and it requires great planning, coordination and purposeful execution to bring iconic experiences that inspire audiences each summer.

In 2022 alone the Festival employed 269 people and 630 local, national and international artists to present 125 events and 521 sessions across dozens of venues throughout the city.

We expended at least 10,000 human hours, built four new venues and installed event infrastructure in parks, on beaches, in warehouses and even at the foot of a lighthouse.

We travelled 4,188 km to share the Festival with regional audiences from the Great Southern to the Pilbara and reached out to schools and community organisations around our vast State.

Ticket sales, however, covered just 17% of what we needed to bring the Festival to life and make the arts accessible to diverse audiences. Another 50% came from our major funders, Lotterywest and The University of Western Australia, to whom we are most grateful. For the rest, we depend on our family of generous partners, foundations, and philanthropists – where even a small donation, volunteer time or in-kind contribution can add up to us all collectively making a big difference.

Over the past seven decades your support has enabled us to climb ambitious artistic heights – from the epic visit of *The Giants* to Antony Gormley's iconic *Inside Australia* sculptures in the eastern Goldfields; from showcasing world films under the stars at UWA Somerville to the dazzling *Boorna Waanginy: The Trees Speak* at Kings Park.

Your support has helped nurture the next generation of artists and commission countless new works. Extraordinary artists have come to our shores – from Duke Ellington to the Royal Shakespeare Company; from Margaret Atwood to Komische Oper Berlin. They have stood side by side with our world-class homegrown talent – from launching Black Swan State Theatre Company's retelling of Tim Winton's *Cloudstreet* in 1998 to Kate Mulvaney's dramatic adaptation of *Mary Stuart* just last year.

These moments, and many more that are sprinkled throughout our 70-year history, will leave a deep

impression in our collective psyche, and with your support will continue to bind us through shared stories and lasting memories. As we look to another Festival to celebrate all that is wonderful about our place in the world, we ask you to help us reach for the stars and create world-class artistic experiences that enrich life in Western Australia.

As Festival season beckons international and local audiences and artists will once again join students, staff and our broader WA community to kick-start 2023 at this thriving hub of culture, education, innovation and social engagement.

Grounded on Noongar Boodjar and celebrating its people's stories and rich cultural practices, the Festival is just one part of UWA's extensive community engagement activities. The University is a year-round hub of music, theatre, exhibitions, literary talks and other cultural programs

Perth Festival was born in the UWA Somerville Auditorium's cathedral of pines in 1953 as The University's gift to a community hungry for connection through art. In the inaugural program, founder Prof. Fred Alexander wrote that the Festival was created to "encourage West Australians to draw on real advantages of scene and climate to offset disabilities imposed by distance". Each year the Festival expanded in scale, ambition and reach, defying the early sceptics' claims that an international arts festival in Perth was too ambitious for a State so far removed from the eastern seaboard.

From those campus beginnings, Perth Festival remains embedded in its community while reaching out to the world. The spirit of The University's first 'Festival for the people' continues into the third decade of the 21st century.



BUILDING A VIBRANT COMMUNITY THROUGH ART

For more than 30 years, Lotterywest and Perth Festival have worked together to build a better Western Australia through shared experiences of the arts. Western Australians are very fortunate to hold Australia's only State-owned and operated lottery, and one of the few in the world with a community grants program, one that distributed \$323 million across WA in 2021 – 22 alone.


